Cal's Market Read

Overnight, corn added about 10 cents; beans added about 8 cents; and wheat slipped about 2 cents.

Recent trend, over the last 5 sessions, corn has eased and beans have firmed. That is the backdrop your cash bid is moving against.

Here is our read on why corn and beans firmed while wheat eased overnight, and honestly the news does not point to one clean cause. With no USDA report on the calendar, our best assessment is weather doing the talking, since the Ohio Country Journal forecast shows heat and humidity building into the mid 90s across that state this week with little rain. The Tri-State Neighbor note on a possible record El Nino in 2027 may also have traders thinking ahead on growing season risk.

Stocks point higher into the open, S&P; futures up about 0.2 percent. A firmer tape eases the borrowing and input-cost mood your lender watches, though it does not move your cash bid by itself.

Decision Delivered

Your decisions for today and the week ahead:

- Paperwork: FSA crop acreage reporting is due July 15 for spring planted crops. That is in 2 days, so prep now, get your planted acres by field, planting dates, and any prevented planting ready for your county Farm Service Agency office now, a late certification can put your farm program payments and crop insurance at risk.
- Standing reminder: Scout soybeans for aphids, the 250-per-plant treatment threshold drives the spray decision. Check corn ears for fill and tip-back.
- Reminder: Watch for the corn VT/R1 tassel-silk window for fungicide, and scout soybeans entering R1-R3 for white mold risk in thick, wet canopies.

Farm context: Harfmann Farm, 60 acres of hay, owner-operated since 1992 (real intake on file).

What to Watch Today

- Field window: any rain risk eases by 6 AM, then the working day looks dry enough for field passes. Check the wind first.
- Market watch: corn up about 10 cents, beans up about 8 cents going into the day. Wheat down about 2 cents. Watch the cash bid at your elevator.

1. MFU Coffee Shop Has Two Foods on New Fair Foods List The Minnesota Farmers Union Coffee Shop earned two spots on the 2026 Minnesota State Fair's list of 36 new foods, and both lean hard on local farm ingredients. The Apple Donut Ham Grinder stacks deep-fried, cinnamon-sugared First Kiss apple rings from Pleasant Valley Orchard with uncured ham from Hidden Stream Farm, arugula, hot honey and herb-whipped ricotta on a hoagie, while the Banana Butterscotch Barnraiser brings a church-basement potluck vibe topped with Stony Creek Dairy whipped cream. MFU President Gary Wertish says the goal is showcasing Minnesota flavors through fellow union members, and the shop at 1635 Dan Patch Ave. runs 7 a.m. to 9 p.m. all 12 days, managed by the union's own Farmers Kitchen + Bar in Minneapolis. It is a nice reminder that farmer-owned businesses can turn Iowa's neighboring state fair, running Aug. 27 to Sept. 7, into a showcase for the folks who actually grow the food, a tradition MFU has kept since 1953. 2. Record El Nino possible in 2027 Climate scientists are warning that 2027 could bring a record setting El Nino, a Pacific Ocean warming pattern that shapes growing season weather across the Corn Belt. The forecast comes from data tracked by Berkeley Earth, an independent nonprofit that gathers and shares open climate and air quality records for anyone to check. Their latest numbers show that May temperatures already rank 2026 among the warmest years ever measured, adding fuel to the concern. For a farmer planning ahead, a strong El Nino can mean big shifts in rainfall and heat during planting and harvest, so this is worth watching closely. [Read the full article](#). 3. Washington Week Ahead: Graham's death weighs on Senate South Carolina Republican Lindsey Graham, a 23 year Senate veteran and staunch ethanol backer, died Saturday evening from a brief, sudden illness, drawing tributes from Trump, Senator Adam Schiff, and world leaders like Zelenskyy and Netanyahu. His passing, along with the hospitalization of Kentucky's Mitch McConnell, thins an already slim GOP Senate margin just as major farm policy hangs in the balance. This week corn, soybean, and biofuel groups are flying in to Washington to push a bill allowing year round national sales of E15, with Majority Leader John Thune working to get it to a floor vote and Trump wanting it tacked onto a military funding package. That same supplemental fight could deliver roughly 11 billion dollars in aid to farmers facing high costs, so with a five week recess starting August 8 and midterms on November 3, the coming days may decide whether relief arrives before next season. 4. 'Jurassic Park' actor Sam Neill dies at 78 Sam Neill, the New Zealand raised actor born in Northern Ireland in 1947, has died at 78 with his family at his side, cancer free at the end despite years of treatment. Though he acted for more than five decades, from his 1977 breakout in "Sleeping Dogs" to villain turns in "Omen III" and later parts in "Peaky Blinders," "The Tudors," and even the "Thor" movies, the world knew him best as Dr. Alan Grant in Steven Spielberg's 1993 "Jurassic Park," a role he reprised across three films and once called "an old comfortable pair of boots." He was honored as an Officer of the Order of the British Empire in 1991, a moment he shared with his dying father, and was knighted in the New Zealand Order of Merit in 2022. In 2023 he revealed he was battling stage 3 blood cancer, speaking openly about the "dark moments" of chemotherapy while saying they left him grateful for every day and for his friends. 5. Indiana Master Farmer Awards Celebrate Agricultural Excellence and Conservation Leaders Indiana's top farming honor was handed out last week in West Lafayette, presented by Indiana Prairie Farmer and Purdue University Extension. Knox County's Susan Brocksmyth, president of the Indiana Corn Marketing Council and a dean

at Vincennes University, joined a family legacy that includes her grandfather in 1968, her father-in-law in 1996, and her husband in 2004, all while running a no-till, cover-crop operation. Soil stewardship was the banquet's big theme, with Hamilton County's Rodney and Natasha Rulon sharing conservation lessons and Honorary Master Farmer Barry Fisher of Putnam County, a 39-year USDA veteran, arguing that conserving resources is simply smart business and the true path to sustainability. Also honored were Posey County dairy farmers Dale and Lisa Koester and Lawrence County cattle producers Stan and Ann Armstrong, rounding out a class that ties farm success directly to protecting the land for future generations. 6. Purdue Extension Returns to the 2026 Indiana State Fair with Interactive Agriculture, 4-H and Family Fun

Purdue Extension is heading back to the Indiana State Fair, which runs 17 days from August 7 through August 23 under the theme "Always a Hit" and stays closed on Mondays. Angie Abbott, director of Purdue Extension, says the north side Extension Building will host rotating exhibits on farm succession planning, forestry, animal sciences, gardening tips from Master Gardener volunteers, and 4-H career readiness. Livestock draws big crowds, so Animal Town will show pigs, cattle, sheep, goats, horses, llamas, rabbits and poultry, with Purdue Animal Sciences ambassadors on hand daily and vet students caring for the 4-H animals. There is free Conagra popcorn each afternoon from 1 to 5 p.m., topped with student made flavors like Hammer Down Dill and All-American Caramel Apple, plus a trip back to the 1800s at Pioneer Village with antique tractors and fiddler and liar's contests. 7. Ohio Ag Weather and Forecast, July 13, 2026 Heat and humidity take over Ohio this week, with highs climbing from the upper 80s to mid 90s Monday through Friday and heat indices pushing into the low triple digits, though timely breezes should take some edge off. The state stays rain free until at least Saturday midday, when pop up heat thunderstorms fire late Saturday and again Sunday, but coverage runs only about 60%, so some fields could miss out. The bigger event arrives Monday the 20th with strong, possibly severe storms lingering into early Tuesday, dropping a combined .25 to 1.5 inches on 80% coverage. Another round of strong to severe weather is flagged for the night of Saturday the 25th into Sunday the 26th, with more heat driven storm chances the week of the 27th and, importantly, no long term dry concerns on the horizon. Ohio Ag Net Podcast, Ep. 452, Data Center Impact Analysis Underway Ohio lawmakers, before breaking for the summer, launched a study to measure how data centers are affecting rural communities, and Evan Callicoat, director of state policy with Ohio Farm Bureau, breaks down what that could mean on the latest Ohio Ag Net Podcast powered by Ohio Corn and Wheat. Callicoat also digs into recent legislative action on property taxes and E15, two issues that hit close to home for anyone farming and watching their bottom line. In the second half, Dusty Sonnenberg takes the Field Leader Roadshow to Van Wert County to sit down with Mike and Kendra of Heffelfinger Farms, a family operation with roots stretching all the way back to 1852. They talk about how agriculture in Van Wert County has changed over the generations and what they see coming down the road for the future of their farm. [Read the full article](#). The principle, identical parts made by machine, assembled by less-skilled labor, became the foundation of the McCormick reaper factory (1847), the Deere plow works (1855), and every farm-equipment factory since.
