Overnight, corn added about 2 cents; beans added about 11 cents; and wheat added about 3 cents.

Recent trend, over the last 3 sessions, corn has firmed and beans have firmed. That is the backdrop your cash bid is moving against.

Here is our read on why. Cutting the other way, demand still reads firm per Morning Ag Clips: Dairy Pasture Walks Featured in Iowa Grazing Academy. Honest truth, the tape does not hand us one clean reason today, so take this as our best read, not gospel.

Stocks point lower into the open, S&P; futures off about 1.1 percent. A softer tape can tighten the credit and input-cost mood your lender watches, worth a glance, but it does not set your cash bid.

Decision Delivered

Your decisions for today and the week ahead:

- Paperwork: FSA crop acreage reporting is due July 15 for spring planted crops. That is in 7 days, so prep now, get your planted acres by field, planting dates, and any prevented planting ready for your county Farm Service Agency office now, a late certification can put your farm program payments and crop insurance at risk.
- Reminder for this week: Corn is approaching the canopy and tasseling weeks are ahead, now is the time to book your fungicide window if you plan a VT/R1 pass, before the applicator calendar fills.
- Standing reminder: Dig an 8-inch root cube on a few plants in continuous-corn fields to confirm your rootworm trait is holding, and rescout soybeans for early defoliators.

Farm context: Harfmann Farm, 60 acres of hay, owner-operated since 1992 (real intake on file).

What to Watch Today

- Rain watch: through the workday the best rain chance is around 5 PM (70%). Time spray and field passes to the drier hours, and check the wind first.
- Market watch: corn up about 2 cents, beans up about 11 cents going into the day. Wheat up about 3 cents. Watch the cash bid at your elevator.

3. U.S. farmers pay more for inputs than Brazil, corn group says

"The price gouging that is happening for U.S. It also is calling for heightened transparency from input providers and for pricing to reflect "the realities of the current economic environment." Swanson stressed that the study shows cost differences even when taking into account that U.S. growers have enough choices," Swanson said. crop science unit said the domestic glyphosate business as it stands today isn't sustainable and that China has engaged in "predatory trade practices and subsidized imports of glyphosate." The corn group said its report stems from months of work by NCGA's Inputs Task Force, chaired by Frostic and formed to identify factors contributing to sustained record or near-record input cost highs in recent years.

4. Identifying Nutrient Deficiency Symptoms in Soybeans

When soybean leaves turn pale or yellow this season, K-State agronomist Dorivar Ruiz Diaz says nutrient shortages are one likely culprit, and where the color change shows up tells you a lot. Mobile nutrients like nitrogen, phosphorus, potassium, and magnesium show symptoms first on the lower, older leaves, while immobile ones like iron, manganese, and sulfur strike the upper, youngest leaves first. The article walks through the telltale signs, pale green nitrogen-starved plants tied to poor nodulation, interveinal iron and manganese chlorosis on high pH or sandy ground, purple phosphorus-cupped leaves in cool wet soils, and yellow leaf margins from potassium loss. It matters because high-yielding soybeans pull heavy amounts of nutrients per bushel, and sulfur shortfalls are on the rise thanks to cleaner air, so reading these leaf clues early can protect your yield.

5. Lean Hogs

October lean hog futures opened steady but slid to close just under Monday's low, a letdown for bulls after Monday marked the highest close in a month, according to The Hightower Report. Last week's hog slaughter and pork production ran significantly above year ago levels, which added pressure to the market. Cutout prices did tick higher at midsession, yet they are still running behind normal seasonal levels. Futures ended mixed, with front months up 50 cents to \$1.70 while deferred months slipped 7 to 30 cents, as reported by Austin Schroeder for Barchart.

6. At NATO summit, Trump pressures allies on loyalty, defense spending and Greenland

Meeting NATO leaders in Ankara, Turkey, President Trump leaned hard on European allies over their defense budgets and their refusal to back the U.S. and Israeli war on Iran, even as fresh American strikes hit Iran during the summit. In a surprise, Trump signaled he would finally sell Turkey the F-35, the most advanced U.S. fighter jet, calling President Erdogan more loyal than other allies, despite Israeli and congressional objections tied to Turkey's Russian air defense missiles. He also revived his threat to take Greenland from NATO ally Denmark, mocked Europe as decaying, and questioned why the U.S. keeps spending hundreds of billions while allies decline to help. NATO chief Mark Rutte pushed back by unveiling new European-built planes, long-range missiles, and satellites toward the 5 percent of GDP defense goal set for 2035, though the report warns Europe will stay dependent on American power for years while those weapons are still being fielded.

7. New truck leads to life of love, part 2

Marilyn Smith told her milkman boyfriend Vladimir "Bud" Shiftar back in 1950 that she would return to Wisconsin only if he bought a new Divco milk truck to spare her from the exhaust fumes, and he did, leading to their 1956 wedding in La Crosse. Their farm life near La Crosse got wild, including a troublemaking pet monkey given to Bud by a milk customer, a monkey that watched the family barn burn before being handed off to a traveling circus. In one of the boldest moments, Bud spotted a tiger-wrestling show at the La Crosse County Fairgrounds, jumped up when the announcer asked for volunteers, and started wrestling the tigers himself, not knowing a hired stuntman was sitting right there in the crowd. The old Shiftar farm and salvage yard is now the headquarters of Kwik Trip, and this second part of Sarah Pfaff-Cavadini's story follows the July 2 opening chapter in Agri-View.

8. Judge orders USDA to restore \$127M in farmland-access grants

A federal judge, Beryl Howell, ordered USDA on June 30 to restore \$127 million in grants under the Increasing Land, Capital, and Market Access program, reversing the agency's March cancellation of 49 of the 50 awards. The USDA had claimed the grants involved discriminatory DEI preferences and possible fraud, but Howell said the government repeatedly failed to back up those claims and that records showed officials mostly just scanned documents for words tied to diversity or climate. Several upper Midwest groups get their money back, including the Sustainable Iowa Land Trust, Iowa Valley RC&D, and South Dakota's Four Bands Community Fund and NDN Collective, all aimed at helping young and underserved producers buy land and secure loans. Advocates call this the largest public investment in land access in the nation's history, and with an aging farm population and a tight land market, the fight over its survival continues in court through September.

9. Cattle futures mostly lower ahead of direct business

Live cattle slipped at the Chicago Mercantile Exchange, with August closing 67 cents lower at \$238.42, while feeder cattle were mixed and traders now expect the bulk of this week's cash business to wait until Thursday or Friday. Country auctions stayed strong, as Missouri's Kingsville sale saw heifers hold steady to \$10 higher and Medium and Large 1 feeder steers in the 668 to 695 pound range fetch \$426 to \$442. On the beef side, Choice boxed beef eased 71 cents to \$385.77, the Choice to Select spread widened to \$19.88, and estimated slaughter of 110,000 head ran nearly 9,000 behind last year. Hogs told a different story, with August lean futures dropping \$1.60 to \$96.92 on fund and technical selling even as pork cutout values climbed \$1.66 to \$97.91 on sharply higher bellies, all matters worth watching if you feed livestock alongside the corn and beans.

10. Protecting stored grain

John Mays of Central Life Sciences warns that your crop stays at risk even after it leaves the field, with hungry pests ready to take money straight out of your pocketbook. He says shifting weather patterns are favoring insects and spreading the threat into states like Iowa, Illinois, Indiana and Ohio, where growers once never worried about bugs in their grain. In just the last two years, Mays says Central Life Sciences has fielded hundreds of calls from producers in those four states alone. His advice is simple but important, clean your bins thoroughly between crops and look into insecticides you can apply to both the bins and the stored grain itself.
