Overnight, corn steady; beans added about 6 cents; and wheat slipped about 5 cents.

Recent trend, over the last 5 sessions, corn has eased and beans have eased. That is the backdrop your cash bid is moving against.

Here is our read on why. Cutting the other way, demand still reads firm per Morning Ag Clips: IL Corn Celebrates Father's Day Farm Family Photo Contest Winners. Honest truth, the tape does not hand us one clean reason today, so take this as our best read, not gospel.

Stocks point higher into the open, S&P; futures up about 0.2 percent. A firmer tape eases the borrowing and input-cost mood your lender watches, though it does not move your cash bid by itself.

Decision Delivered

Your decisions for today and the week ahead:

- Paperwork: FSA crop acreage reporting is due July 15 for spring planted crops. That is tomorrow, so prep now, get your planted acres by field, planting dates, and any prevented planting ready for your county Farm Service Agency office now, a late certification can put your farm program payments and crop insurance at risk.

- Reminder: Corn is filling grain (R3-R5 on seasonal normals) and beans are setting pods, the yield is being built now. Late-season disease and moisture stress matter most here.
- Reminder, still on your list: Hot, dry stretches raise spider-mite pressure on field edges. Scout the south and west borders of soybeans and corn.

Farm context: Founder Edition, no farm operation on file (Notre Dame / Break'n Bad).

What to Watch Today

- Field window: any rain risk eases by 6 AM, then the working day looks dry enough for field passes. Check the wind first.
- Market watch: corn steady, beans up about 6 cents going into the day. Wheat down about 5 cents. Watch the cash bid at your elevator.

3. Hormuz dispute intensifies as U.S.-Iran ceasefire collapses The truce between Washington and Tehran has fallen apart, and President Trump vowed to hit Iran "very hard" while the Pentagon confirmed a third straight night of U.S. strikes after Iran fired on commercial ships in the Strait of Hormuz. Trump plans to blockade the strait, name the U.S. its "guardian," and charge a 20% toll on cargo for safe passage, a move that clashes with Secretary of State Marco Rubio's earlier stance that no country can charge fees on an international waterway. Oil and gasoline prices already jumped Monday, with crude at a nearly four week high and gasoline at a five week high, and Trump says he will address the nation Thursday at 9 p.m. Eastern. This matters to your bottom line because Hormuz is a key chokepoint for both energy and farm goods, and Sen. 4. The garden bounty begins and Lovina shares updates on her family Cooler mornings finally broke the heat, but Lovina Eicher admits her garden is still full of weeds waiting to be pulled. Her son-in-laws cut down a storm-damaged maple at sister Verena's place, landing it across the road and clearing it fast, while Verena also battled a corneal erosion from the dry air and got a medicated contact. The garden is paying off with hot peppers, green peppers, lettuce, onions, zucchini, and a heavy load of green tomatoes that Joe pruned from the bottom up, a new trick he learned at church to boost airflow and prevent blight while sitting on his mobility scooter thanks to three or four herniated discs. U.S. strikes Iran for third night after Trump reinstates Iran blockade For the third straight night, U.S. forces struck targets inside Iran after President Trump reinstated a naval blockade of Iranian ports. The move also includes a proposal to charge new fees on ships passing through the Strait of Hormuz, a narrow waterway that carries much of the world's oil. NBC News correspondent Garrett Haake reports the two nations are now trading strikes along with conflicting claims about control of that vital shipping lane. For a farmer, this matters because tension in the Strait of Hormuz can push fuel and fertilizer costs higher and rattle the export markets your corn and soybeans depend on. Research efforts examine new way to sterilize flies to fight New World screwworm A \$300,000 Rapid Outcomes from Agricultural Research grant, backed by the Foundation for Food & Agriculture Research along with Agragene and North Carolina State University, is funding a fresh push to knock down New World screwworm numbers as U.S. cases climb. The heart of the work is new technology that breeds sterile but still vigorous male flies, which mate with wild females and cause the pest population to collapse over time. Meanwhile, an Iowa State University team drawn from animal science and veterinary diagnostic production animal medicine is launching its own two year research project on the threat. This matters because screwworm larvae feed on the living flesh of cattle and other livestock, so stopping the flies early could spare producers serious animal losses and costly outbreaks. 10. MO crop update: corn needs rain as soybeans, cotton and rice hold strong Missouri farmers are watching the skies as corn hits its critical pollination window bone dry, with northeast grower Jody Ketsenberg saying August rains will make or break his yields even as his soybeans look better than ever. Down in southeast Missouri, Aaron Porter got up to five inches of rain last week that flooded fields but finally gave his irrigators a break after he burned through piles of money on electricity and fuel trying to push water across fluffy, unpacked soil. The USDA numbers tell a mostly encouraging story, with 19 percent of soybeans setting pods and 16 percent of corn in dough stage, both ahead of average, and conditions rated 57 and 68 percent good to excellent. Cotton and rice are the real standouts at 84 and 86 percent good to excellent, so while corn is the worry, the rest of Missouri's fields are holding strong heading into the make or break weeks ahead.
