Overnight, corn slipped about 2 cents; and beans steady.

Recent trend, over the last 5 sessions, corn has firmed and beans have firmed. That is the backdrop your cash bid is moving against.

Here is our read on why. Cutting the other way, demand still reads firm per Morning Ag Clips: Iowa Corn Announces Board Election Results. Honest truth, the tape does not hand us one clean reason today, so take this as our best read, not gospel.

Stocks point higher into the open, S&P; futures up about 0.1 percent. A firmer tape eases the borrowing and input-cost mood your lender watches, though it does not move your cash bid by itself.

Decision Delivered

Your decisions for today and the week ahead:

- Paperwork: The fall ARC and PLC and Dairy Margin Coverage election window opens in late summer. That is in 11 days, so prep now, pull last year's yields and base acres so you can run the payment scenarios before you elect.
- Standing reminder: Watch for the corn VT/R1 tassel-silk window for fungicide, and scout soybeans entering R1-R3 for white mold risk in thick, wet canopies.

- Reminder: Scout soybeans for aphids, the 250-per-plant treatment threshold drives the spray decision. Check corn ears for fill and tip-back.

Farm context: Founder Edition, no farm operation on file (Notre Dame / Break'n Bad).

What to Watch Today

- Rain watch: through the workday the best rain chance is around 6 AM (41%). Time spray and field passes to the drier hours, and check the wind first.
- Market watch: corn down about 2 cents, beans steady going into the day. Watch the cash bid at your elevator.

1. 'It Always Gives Back': Lafayette 4-Her Shares Life Lessons Learned Through County Fair Projects A young 4-Her named Spray shows more than livestock at the county fair, including a sports poster featuring Indiana's historic high school gyms like the New Castle Fieldhouse, Case Arena from the movie "Blue Chips," and the famed Hoosier Gym from "Hoosiers." She says the judging conversations build real communication skills and that 4-H welcomes everyone, even kids without a farm, thanks to projects ranging from photography and sewing to baking and electric. Her biggest takeaway is that 4-H always gives back, teaching hard work and pride in whatever you create or show, win or lose. Spray shows her pigs Wednesday night, and the story is a warm reminder to visit your county fair and support 4-H while there is still time. [Read the full article](#). 2. "In the Weeds" Glyphosate News Roundup: July 21, 2026 The Supreme Court has ruled that federal pesticide labels override state failure to warn claims, a decision Bayer says should dismiss current Roundup cancer lawsuits and block future ones after nearly a decade of legal fights. Groups like the American Soybean Association and National Corn Growers Association backed Bayer in a 12 organization brief, arguing the EPA has repeatedly found glyphosate safe when used as directed, a big win for no tillers who rely on it to terminate cover crops. Just five days later, though, those same farm groups turned on Bayer after it petitioned for antidumping duties as high as 446.47 percent on Chinese glyphosate, warning the tariffs will spike input costs for already squeezed growers. Bayer, the last domestic glyphosate maker supplying about 60 percent of the U.S. market, says the move protects American production, but with a Texas A&M study pegging similar fertilizer duties at 6.9 billion dollars in grower costs and an ITC ruling due in about two months, this fight over your weed control bill is far from over. 3. Opinion: The farm bill should support independent farmers, not corporations Farmers scored a win when the Senate left the Save Our Bacon Act out of its June farm bill draft, a measure that would have gutted California's Proposition 12 and hundreds of other voter approved animal welfare laws while favoring big industrial operations. The authors, independent livestock farmers from Virginia, argue that simply keeping the status quo is not enough when more than 158,000 farms have closed since the last farm bill and small to mid size operations make up 85 percent of American farmers. They warn that decades of policy have funneled money and infrastructure to concentrated animal feeding operations, leaving crowded, unhealthy animals more prone to outbreaks like bird flu and screwworm. Showcasing their own pasture raised pigs, goats, and poultry sold straight to neighbors, they call on Congress to use the final bill to fund and support independent farmers who deliver cleaner water, healthier soil, and the food consumers actually want. 4. Senate Farm Bill Faces Collapse After GOP Leadership Upheaval and SNAP Standoff Republican hopes of passing "Farm Bill 2.0" before the August recess are crumbling, as Chairman John Boozman cannot even guarantee a committee markup in the two weeks left on the calendar. The math fell apart after Sen. Lindsey Graham died and

Leader Mitch McConnell was hospitalized, robbing the GOP of the full attendance it needs, while Democrats led by Amy Klobuchar refuse to budge on SNAP changes that penalize high error rate states. Boozman already dropped fights over California's Proposition 12, state SNAP exemptions, and pesticide rules, choosing instead to expand crop insurance, raise loan caps, and modernize rural broadband and childcare. This gridlock matters because family farm bankruptcies jumped 46 percent in 2025, and a planned \$10 billion emergency bridge payment plus year-round E15 ethanol expansion now hang in the balance. 5. Lean Hogs October lean hog futures pushed to a fresh high for the move early in the session before easing back to settle a touch lower, according to The Hightower Report. Analysts there note that last week delivered a very strong weekly close, a positive technical signal, while cash hogs firmed by roughly a dollar over the same stretch. Even with a setback the day before, the report says it still gives the bulls the edge heading forward. Traders were also weighing fresh USDA supply and demand numbers released last Friday, which could shape where pork production and prices head next. [Read the full article](#). 6. Trump imposes 50% tariffs on Canadian alcohol, dairy and automobiles President Trump signed three executive actions Monday slapping 50% tariffs on Canadian alcohol, dairy, and automobiles, even on goods that comply with the USMCA trade deal, though he carved out exemptions for potash fertilizer, fish, and critical minerals. To do it, the administration reached back to a Great Depression era law called Section 338, a never before used tool that lets the president hit countries that discriminate against U.S. commerce, after earlier tariff attempts were struck down by the Supreme Court. Trade Representative Jamieson Greer said the move punishes Canada for retaliation, pointing to provinces yanking American alcohol off shelves and cheese rules that would otherwise force U.S. producers to pay a punishing 245% rate. The tariffs take effect in 30 days, arriving just as Trump also threatened new penalties over Canadian wildfire smoke choking the East Coast, so farmers watching fertilizer and trade markets will want to see how this fight shakes out. Heroes learn farm rescue At a recent Farm Rescue Day in Barneveld, Wisconsin, volunteer firefighters and emergency medical crews trained hands on with real farm machinery, learning to free mannequins pinned in augers, hay implements, and overturned tractors using saws, airbags, and wood blocks. Chief Bud Schlimgen of the Barneveld-Brigham Fire Department showed responders how a power take off works and how to safely shut off power to equipment still hooked to a tractor. Wisconsin dairy farmer Kyle Thompson shared the story of his own recent farm accident, a sober reminder that these wrecks strike when you least expect them and that many of us forget our own near misses. 10. Video of the Week: No-Till Field Gets 9 Inches of Rain Overnight Farmer Ross Bishop filmed his no-till wheat field the morning of August 10th after a stunning 9.1 inches of rain fell overnight, and the water running off was

crystal clear instead of the chocolate milk brown you would see coming off tilled ground headed for Lake Michigan. He credits 30 years of no-till and cover crops for that clean runoff, along with better yields every year, less labor, and fuel savings. As he gets older, he says he no longer has the ambition for rock picking and working the ground, and a prairie strip stands in the background as part of his conservation setup. It is a real world look at how these practices hold soil in place during extreme downpours, keeping your dirt in your field instead of washing it downstream. [Read the full article](#). In 1882, French botanist Pierre-Marie-Alexis Millardet noticed that grape vines along Bordeaux roads, sprayed blue to deter thieves, were free of downy mildew. The copper sulfate / lime mixture (Bordeaux mixture) became the first scientifically validated fungicide, still used in organic apple and grape production today.
