Cal's Market Read

Overnight, corn added about 2 cents; and beans added about 6 cents.

Recent trend, over the last 5 sessions, corn has firmed and beans have firmed. That is the backdrop your cash bid is moving against.

Here is our read on why. Cutting the other way, demand still reads firm per Hoosier Ag Today: House Passes \$12 Billion Farm Aid Package, But Senate Roadblocks Lie Ahead. Honest truth, the tape does not hand us one clean reason today, so take this as our best read, not gospel.

Stocks point higher into the open, S&P; futures up about 0.4 percent. A firmer tape eases the borrowing and input-cost mood your lender watches, though it does not move your cash bid by itself.

- Reminder, still on your list: Hot, dry stretches raise spider-mite pressure on field edges. Scout the south and west borders of soybeans and corn.

Farm context: Founder Edition, Milford, Iowa (Dickinson County). Per-farm Decision Delivered ships when Phase 2 has live intake.

What to Watch Today

- Field window: any rain risk eases by 6 AM, then the working day looks dry enough for field passes. Check the wind first.
- Market watch: corn up about 2 cents, beans up about 6 cents going into the day. Watch the cash bid at your elevator.

House Passes \$12 Billion Farm Aid Package, But Senate Roadblocks Lie Ahead House of Representatives to narrowly approve a \$95 billion budget reconciliation package containing \$12 billion in emergency agricultural assistance. Specialty Crop Recovery: Beyond the grain belt, the funding addresses acute natural disasters. Despite strong backing from the American Farm Bureau Federation and House Agriculture Committee leaders, the reconciliation package faces severe headwinds in the upper chamber. We have to work on year-round E15, and we have to work on helping farmers deal with catastrophic natural disasters like the wildfires in California, the freeze in Florida," Newton said. Another aspect that growers are fighting back against is the misconception that producing more biofuels equates to more land entering production. "We just want to make sure it benefits Minnesota as a whole, not to blindly follow another state's standard."
