Spray Window

Do NOT spray right now. Wind at your nearest weather station is about 16 mph right now, gusting 22 (the hour-by-hour table above is the NWS forecast, which can read lower). That is over the wind ceiling most labels set (glyphosate and fungicides cap at 10 mph, dicamba and 2,4-D at 15). It will drift onto neighbors or off your field. Wait for a calmer window.

Cal's Market Read

At Friday's close, corn steady; and beans added about 10 cents.

Recent trend, over the last 5 sessions, corn has firmed and beans have firmed. That is the backdrop your cash bid is moving against.

Here is our read on why. Cutting the other way, demand still reads firm per AgWeek: Moisture-deficit concerns continue to add up across the upper Midwest. Honest truth, the tape does not hand us one clean reason today, so take this as our best read, not gospel.

Stocks point higher into the open, S&P; futures up about 0.1 percent. A firmer tape eases the borrowing and input-cost mood your lender watches, though it does not move your cash bid by itself.

- Reminder for this week: Watch for the corn VT/R1 tassel-silk window for fungicide, and scout soybeans entering R1-R3 for white mold risk in thick, wet canopies.

Farm context: Founder Edition, no farm operation on file (Notre Dame / Break'n Bad).

What to Watch Today

- Field window: any rain risk eases by 7 AM, then the working day looks dry enough for field passes. Check the wind first.
- Market watch: corn steady, beans up about 10 cents going into the day. Watch the cash bid at your elevator.
- On the wire: Moisture-deficit concerns continue to add up across the upper Midwest (see Cal's News Desk below).

"Are they going to be fat cattle?" "And again, additional flight dispersal coming on the end of this year." Ag Secretary Brooke Rollins says following the reopening of the Douglas, Arizona port of entry, operational steps will be implemented simultaneously for subsequent openings at the Santa Teresa, New Mexico and Columbus, New Mexico ports. On May 28, 1956, President Eisenhower signed the Agricultural Act creating the Soil Bank, the direct ancestor of today's Conservation Reserve Program. The 1956 program paid farmers to idle 28.7 million acres at its peak. The legal mechanism traces back to the 1936 Soil Conservation and Domestic Allotment Act.
