Spray Window

Do NOT spray right now. Wind at your nearest weather station is about 10 mph right now, gusting 10 (the hour-by-hour table above is the NWS forecast, which can read lower). That is over the wind ceiling most labels set (glyphosate and fungicides cap at 10 mph, dicamba and 2,4-D at 15). It will drift onto neighbors or off your field. Wait for a calmer window.

Overnight, corn slipped about 14 cents; and beans slipped about 36 cents.

Recent trend, over the last 5 sessions, corn has eased and beans have eased. That is the backdrop your cash bid is moving against.

Here is our read on why. Cutting the other way, demand still reads firm per Hoosier Ag Today: USDA Announces Phased Reopening of Southern Cattle Ports Amid Strict New World Screwworm Safeguards. Honest truth, the tape does not hand us one clean reason today, so take this as our best read, not gospel.

Stocks point higher into the open, S&P; futures up about 0.3 percent. A firmer tape eases the borrowing and input-cost mood your lender watches, though it does not move your cash bid by itself.

- Reminder: Watch for the corn VT/R1 tassel-silk window for fungicide, and scout soybeans entering R1-R3 for white mold risk in thick, wet canopies.

Farm context: Harfmann Farm, 60 acres of hay, owner-operated since 1992 (real intake on file).

What to Watch Today

- Field window: any rain risk eases by 6 AM, then the working day looks dry enough for field passes. Check the wind first.
- Market watch: corn down about 14 cents, beans down about 36 cents going into the day. Watch the cash bid at your elevator.
- On the wire: USDA Announces Phased Reopening of Southern Cattle Ports Amid Strict New World Screwworm Safeguards (see Cal's News Desk below).
