Spray Window

Do NOT spray right now. Wind at your nearest weather station is about 10 mph right now, gusting 10 (the hour-by-hour table above is the NWS forecast, which can read lower). That is over the wind ceiling most labels set (glyphosate and fungicides cap at 10 mph, dicamba and 2,4-D at 15). It will drift onto neighbors or off your field. Wait for a calmer window.

Stocks are steady going into the open, S&P; futures close to flat. A calm Wall Street is what your banker likes to see, it keeps the rate and input-cost backdrop behind your operating note quiet for another day.

Your decisions for today and the week ahead:

- Standing reminder: Scout soybeans for aphids, the 250-per-plant treatment threshold drives the spray decision. Check corn ears for fill and tip-back.

Farm context: Founder Edition, no farm operation on file (Notre Dame / Break'n Bad).

What to Watch Today

- Field window: any rain risk eases by 6 AM, then the working day looks dry enough for field passes. Check the wind first.
- Market watch: corn up about 3 cents, beans up about 3 cents going into the day. Watch the cash bid at your elevator.

Senate panel delays critical vote to advance Blanche attorney general nomination A spokesperson for the Senate Judiciary Committee, which is led by Chairman Chuck Grassley (R-IA), suggested Wednesday's vote was pushed back because Blanche lacks the support necessary to advance his nomination. "Senators Cornyn and Tillis want written assurances from the Department of Justice regarding the Trump-IRS settlement. Cornyn said he and his staff provided the DOJ with a "red-line strikeout" outlining potential changes. "He's just being realistic about planning a markup." Cornyn is pressing the DOJ to spell out how broadly the settlement's audit-immunity provision would apply, including whether it would shield recipients from enforcement by agencies beyond the IRS and Treasury Department.
