Overnight, corn slipped about 2 cents; and beans slipped about 5 cents.

Recent trend, over the last 5 sessions, corn has eased and beans have eased. That is the backdrop your cash bid is moving against.

Here is our read on why. Cutting the other way, demand still reads firm per Hoosier Ag Today: Senate Farm Bill Draft Expected to Add Year-Round E15 Provision. Honest truth, the tape does not hand us one clean reason today, so take this as our best read, not gospel.

Stocks are steady going into the open, S&P; futures close to flat. A calm Wall Street is what your banker likes to see, it keeps the rate and input-cost backdrop behind your operating note quiet for another day.

- Standing reminder: Scout soybeans for aphids, the 250-per-plant treatment threshold drives the spray decision. Check corn ears for fill and tip-back.

Farm context: Founder Edition, Milford, Iowa (Dickinson County). Per-farm Decision Delivered ships when Phase 2 has live intake.

What to Watch Today

- Field window: any rain risk eases by 6 AM, then the working day looks dry enough for field passes. Check the wind first.
- Market watch: corn down about 2 cents, beans down about 5 cents going into the day. Watch the cash bid at your elevator.
- On the wire: Senate Farm Bill Draft Expected to Add Year-Round E15 Provision (see Cal's News Desk below).

1. Senate Farm Bill Draft Expected to Add Year-Round E15 Provision Senate negotiators are moving to include a provision in the updated farm bill draft that would allow year-round nationwide sales of E15 gasoline, reversing an earlier version that left the measure out. This is welcome news for corn growers, who have pushed hard for the change and see E15 as a way to expand demand for their crop. The addition matters because it opens up a bigger, year-round market for ethanol blended fuel, something that has been limited by seasonal restrictions in the past. For Iowa corn farmers, this could mean stronger prices and steadier sales, making it well worth following how the final bill shakes out. [Read the full article](#). 2. Washington Week Ahead: E15, SNAP in spotlight with farm bill markup Senator John Thune and corn groups are cheering a revised farm bill that would finally let higher ethanol blend E15 be sold year round, a demand boost that could mean more buyers for your corn. Ag Committee Chairman John Boozman, R-Ark., released the draft Friday and set a Thursday markup, but the E15 win still has to survive expected pushback from petroleum interests. The bill also softens the coming SNAP hit on states, delaying by one year the new costs for states with payment error rates between 6 and 10 percent, while those over 10 percent would pay 20 percent starting in 2031. On top of all that, Senate leaders are racing to pass a stopgap funding bill before the September 30 deadline to avoid a government shutdown, all just before lawmakers head home for a five week recess. 3. Cattle finishing faces challenges Purdue University economist Michael Langemeier, who directs the Center for Commercial Agriculture, warns that finishing cattle for market is getting tougher for producers. His outlook shows that feeder to fed cattle price ratios will stay relatively high through the rest of 2026 and into the first six months of 2027. That high ratio means the cost of buying feeder animals is eating deep into the margin folks can earn once the cattle reach slaughter weight. For anyone weighing whether to run cattle alongside the corn and beans, this signals thinner profits ahead and a good reason to pencil the numbers carefully before filling the lot. 4. Mexican Cattle Imports to Resume Amid Screwworm Concerns Starting August 24, USDA will reopen the door to Mexican cattle after halting those imports earlier this year when the flesh eating New World screwworm turned up in southern Mexico. Before restarting, the agency ramped up surveillance, released more sterile flies, and tightened inspections, and it says only approved facilities meeting stronger health rules will be allowed to ship. Feedlots and packers are eager for the extra animals because the U.S. herd sits at its smallest in decades, driving cattle and beef prices to record highs, though some ranchers warn reopening too soon could let screwworm slip across the border. That worry is not just talk, since outbreaks have already been confirmed in Texas and New Mexico, so this decision could hit both your neighbors' herds and the prices you watch. "These investments are a win for Illinois farmers, food producers and families who help keep our state nourished," said Dave Koehler (D-Peoria), Chief Senate Sponsor. The new Illinois Local Food Infrastructure grant program application process recently ended, but not before many Illinoisans put in their bids for a taste. Through this agreement, USDA and the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) are working together to offer \$27 million in competitive grant funding [...].
