Spray Window

Based on this morning's wind forecast, the spray window looks open 4 AM to midnight (wind at or under 10 mph, the common label ceiling for glyphosate and fungicides; dicamba and 2,4-D allow up to 15). This is the day's plan locked in this morning, not a live reading. Always check your gusts, any ground level inversion, and your product's own wind limit before you start.

Wind this morning at your nearest weather station was about 5 mph.

We could not get a reading right on your field this morning. The nearest weather station (Rochester MN, about 18 miles north) recorded no rain in the past 24 hours. Your own ground may differ, so check your gauge.

Cal's Market Read

At Friday's close, corn added about 22 cents; and beans added about 19 cents.

Recent trend, over the last 5 sessions, corn has firmed and beans have firmed. That is the backdrop your cash bid is moving against.

Here is our read on why. Cutting the other way, demand still reads firm per Tri-State Neighbor: East Bench Grain provides market opportunities for local growers. Honest truth, the tape does not hand us one clean reason today, so take this as our best read, not gospel.

Stocks point higher into the open, S&P; futures up about 0.7 percent. A firmer tape eases the borrowing and input-cost mood your lender watches, though it does not move your cash bid by itself.

- Reminder, still on your list: Scout soybeans for aphids, the 250-per-plant treatment threshold drives the spray decision. Check corn ears for fill and tip-back.

Farm context: Founder Edition, no farm operation on file (Notre Dame / Break'n Bad).

What to Watch Today

- Rain watch: through the workday the best rain chance is around 5 PM (57%). Time spray and field passes to the drier hours, and check the wind first.
- Market watch: corn up about 22 cents, beans up about 19 cents going into the day. Watch the cash bid at your elevator.
- On the wire: East Bench Grain provides market opportunities for local growers (see Cal's News Desk below).

Senate Ag Chairman John Boozman plans to try again the week of Sept. 14 with his Farm Bill 2.0, which would open the door to year round E15 ethanol sales and restore mandatory country of origin
