Spray Window

Based on this morning's wind forecast, the spray window looks open 4 AM to midnight (wind at or under 10 mph, the common label ceiling for glyphosate and fungicides; dicamba and 2,4-D allow up to 15). This is the day's plan locked in this morning, not a live reading. Always check your gusts, any ground level inversion, and your product's own wind limit before you start.

Wind this morning at your nearest weather station was about 7 mph.

Rain Window

We could not get a reading right on your field this morning. The nearest weather station (Rochester MN, about 18 miles north) recorded no rain in the past 24 hours. Your own ground may differ, so check your gauge.

Cal's Market Read

Overnight, corn added about 24 cents; and beans added about 21 cents.

Recent trend, over the last 5 sessions, corn has eased and beans have eased. That is the backdrop your cash bid is moving against.

Here is our read on why corn and beans both firmed overnight. The cleanest driver we see is China stepping up U.S. soybean purchases, snapping up 238,000 metric tons last week ahead of the Trump to Xi meeting, per Hoosier Ag Today, and that demand signal tends to lift corn alongside beans. With no USDA report due, we would also credit the fresh U.S. to Canada tariff news out of Hoosier Ag Today stirring trade uncertainty. Call it demand and trade, not one clean cause.

Stocks point lower into the open, S&P; futures off about 0.1 percent. A softer tape can tighten the credit and input-cost mood your lender watches, worth a glance, but it does not set your cash bid.

Your decisions for today and the week ahead:

- Standing reminder: Scout soybeans for aphids, the 250-per-plant treatment threshold drives the spray decision. Check corn ears for fill and tip-back.

Farm context: Founder Edition, no farm operation on file (Notre Dame / Break'n Bad).

What to Watch Today

- Rain watch: through the workday the best rain chance is around 2 PM (85%). Time spray and field passes to the drier hours, and check the wind first.
- Market watch: corn up about 24 cents, beans up about 21 cents going into the day. Watch the cash bid at your elevator.

1. Canada Faces New U.S. Tariffs as Trade Talks Intensify Washington is set to slap a 50 percent duty on a range of Canadian goods starting August 19, and both sides are racing to cut a deal before the deadline. Canada and Mexico want the U.S.-Mexico-Canada Agreement locked in for another 16 years, but the Trump administration opted for rolling annual reviews instead. At the same time, Dairy Farmers of Canada is pressing Prime Minister Mark Carney to hold firm on the country's supply management system, saying past concessions only brought fresh American demands. For anyone watching cross border ag trade, this fight over dairy access and tariff pressure could reshape how North America buys and sells farm goods for years to come. [Read the full article](#). 2. China Steps Up U.S. Soybean Purchases Ahead of Trump-Xi Meeting Chinese buyers snapped up 238,000 metric tons of American soybeans last week, a signal that the May meeting between President Trump and President Xi Jinping is starting to pay off for U.S. growers. That order puts China roughly a quarter of the way toward a promised 25 million tons a year through 2028, part of a deal that also has Beijing agreeing to buy at least \$17 billion more in U.S. farm goods annually. The catch is that China has also rolled out new legal and trade measures against

the United States, including tighter export reviews and sanctions on several American entities, though none aim directly at agriculture. With another Trump and Xi meeting expected in September, farmers will want to watch closely, because these shifting trade winds could move soybean demand, prices, and your export planning. 3. Lean Hogs Lean hog futures caught a bid to start the week, with the October contract climbing after buyers jumped in early. According to The Hightower Report, prices opened steady this morning before that quick buying pushed the market higher. The move builds on a minor bounce from Friday, which came right after October hogs had slipped to a fresh one month low. For anyone watching livestock markets, this early strength hints the recent slide may be finding a floor, so the full report is worth a look. [Read the full article](#). 4. Watch: Videos capture the moment a 7.4-magnitude earthquake strikes Colombia A powerful 7.4 magnitude earthquake tore through Colombia on August 10, 2026, and bystander videos captured the ground shaking and buildings coming down in real time. The Colombian president confirmed the death toll climbed past 100, with many people still missing beneath collapsed structures and piles of debris. Rescue crews launched an urgent search for survivors as families waited for word about loved ones trapped in the rubble. 5. What to know about Trump's vaccine executive order Trump on Monday put his signature to an executive order pushing "Make America Healthy Again" vaccine goals, a move that could reshape how families schedule childhood shots. The order urges drugmakers to break apart combination vaccines and to trim the total number of immunizations kids receive. It also declares that the administration will now back what it calls gold standard recommendations covering just 11 core vaccinations against the most serious diseases, along with the MMR. For farm families weighing what this means at the doctor's office, the change signals a notable federal shift in official vaccine advice, so the full article is worth a closer read. 6. Special Olympics Athletes to Shine at Bacon Buddies Show Now in its seventh year, the Iowa State Fair's Bacon Buddies pig show pairs Special Olympics athletes with 4-H and FFA mentors, and it takes the ring at 6:30 p.m. on Saturday, August 15, in the Swine Barn. The event is a partnership between the Iowa Pork Producers Association and Special Olympics Iowa, with each athlete guided by two youth mentors on pig care, showmanship, and working with judges. IPPA President Dean Frazer, a Conrad pig farmer, calls it one of the most rewarding events of the year, while SOI will hand out four \$500 scholarships to mentors chosen by random drawing. What started as one show has grown into a statewide movement, with nearly 50 county fairs hosting Bacon Buddies this year and hundreds of athletes getting their chance to shine, and the fair event is free with paid admission. 7. MDA Seeks Input Before Next Legislative Session The Minnesota Department of Agriculture is asking farmers, businesses, and anyone touched by the food and ag system to pitch policy, funding, and program ideas before it builds the state's next two-year budget. You can weigh in through an online written form that runs from August 10 through September 18, or by joining one of two free public input sessions held over Zoom, which do require registration. All of this feeds into the next legislative session that starts January 12, 2027, when lawmakers will set the two-year agriculture budget that funds MDA programs. It matters because the money and rules farmers deal with get shaped now, so this is a rare chance to speak up before the decisions are locked in. [Read the full article](#). 8. Tradition preserves food security Wild chokecherries and pin cherries, simmered down and drained through a sieve, yield rich red juice that cans up for winter jelly or as an energizing tonic, and it takes only about 3.5 cups to make a batch of jelly. The piece walks through preserving a whole season of abundance, from pickled Hungarian hot peppers and sweet summer squash to cabbage fermented into sauerkraut and hog lard rendered into jars that keep for years. Author Jason Maloney, a retired educator and soldier from Marinette County, Wisconsin who lives on Lake Superior with his wife Cindy Dillenschneider and their Australian Shepherd Red, ties these skills back to ancestors

who survived harsh winters, tornadoes, fires and crop failures on almost nothing. His point is that home canning is more than nostalgia, it is real food security and a memorable family tradition worth learning when you have more time than money. [Read the full article](#). 9. NDSU's new Bolley Agricultural Laboratory 'a legacy worth celebrating' North Dakota State University dedicated its new \$97 million Bolley Agricultural Laboratory on Monday, Aug. 10, drawing several hundred people to tour a facility built for plant pathology, plant breeding, weed science, agronomy, soil science and horticulture. State Sen. Terry Wanzek noted that \$87 million came from the 2023 Legislature and another \$10 million from mostly private contributions, and he called it a state investment rather than an expenditure, while NDSU President Marshall Stewart and board chair Pam Gullekson said the payoff will benefit producers and generations not yet born. The lab honors Henry L. Bolley, an early NDAC plant pathologist who proved to skeptics that soil pathogens build up without crop rotation and who wrote the 1909 North Dakota Pure Seed Act that later shaped federal law, and he also founded and first coached the school's football team. Researchers like potato pathology chair Julie Pasche marveled at the upgrades, from forklifts replacing hand-hauled 100 pound potato bags to stainless steel coolers controlled by phone, and Stewart even joked that one of Bolley's great-great-grandsons touring campus will surely become a Bison. 10. 2026 Ohio Field Leader Crop Tour The Ohio Soybean Checkoff's Field Leader Crop Tour is rolling through about 40 counties over four days, scouting corn and soybeans and posting county results as they come in. Scouts found strong soybean fields with yield estimates climbing from 55 bushels in Henry County up to 60 plus bushels in an April planted field that got 1.5 inches of rain while they scouted, while corn showed mixed results including one early field where hot, dry pollination weather caused jumbled kernels, tip dieback, and gray leaf spot. Bean fields planted back in mid April and mid May are still branching, flowering, and adding pods, so scouts say every new flower is stacking on more yield potential. The tour crew is watching August moisture and September weather closely, since a late fall could decide whether these fields hit their full potential, making this a good early read on what the 2026 crop might deliver.
